Listen to Linthwaite and Cowlersley - turning our conversations into action

What we did in Linthwaite and Cowlersley

In May 2019, volunteers from Pride in Linthwaite worked with the Colne Valley and Golcar Ward Councillors and staff from Kirklees Council to speak to people from across Linthwaite and Cowlersley about what life is like there. 258 people took part in conversations across the 2 villages in a variety of different places such as online, in the streets, at local schools such as Cowlersley Junior School and in local cafés such as Rudi's Retreat. The results from Listen to Linthwaite and Listen to Cowlersley were published in September 2019.

Progress then stalled due to the pandemic and lockdown measures. In summer 2022 Pride in Linthwaite created further opportunities for local people to get involved. More people in Linthwaite shared what they think about the area. They added some new things that were missed earlier, and shared their views on the priorities for action. The group organised six workshops, along with visits to local venues, events and schools. 473 people responded, 214 of which were online. People who shared their views in person did so at one of the 6 public drop-in sessions held across Cowlersley and Linthwaite in places such as Cowlersley Community Out of School Club, The UCHM, The Sair, at the Linthwaite Leadboilers Festival or outside the Premier Store on Manchester Road, and at visits to local junior schools.



Both Listen to Linthwaite and Listen to Cowlersley were led by Pride in Linthwaite in partnership with Kirklees Council. The aim was to better understand what life in both villages is like for the people who work, visit or live there and understand what is missing from these communities as well as what their aspirations might be. The Place Standard

conversations helped us to seek and gather the opinions from residents and talk about the communities of Linthwaite and Cowlersley in a wide ranging way.


Cowlersley is a rural village in the Golcar Ward in Huddersfield, West Yorkshire.



Strengths in Cowlersley

Housing and Community

A great mix of housing types, from social housing right through to large detached housing - it's a mixed community which works well. There are very few houses with decent sized gardens though. Cowlersley is now very built up, so any more housing would negatively impact on the green spaces. The estate could do with a good tidy up of the gardens and a clear up of the rubbish on the streets. New builds on The Heights are small and expensive, with too much tarmac.

Suggestions from participants about Housing and Community

Stop new house building on green belt land.

Natural Space

People appreciate the natural spaces such as Jubilee Park, Coronation Park and local woods. Broad Oak Park is a great space for children to play and is looked after by locals. Participants said they are concerned that green spaces are being lost to house building. The woodlands are not accessible for those with mobility issues, although there are some benches and flower boxes. Public parks are full of glass and litter, overflowing bins, overgrown paths and anti social behaviour by young people (drink, drugs, music, swearing).

Suggestions from participants about Natural Space

More spaces for teenagers to engage in sports. A free outdoor exercise facility or adventurous outdoor space that can be used by people of all ages. More allotments. More green community spaces on council owned land.

Feeling Safe

On the whole, people feel safe. Cowlersley is a close knit community where people look out for one another. There are gangs of young people who intimidate residents and there is drug dealing and opportunistic crime, such as car theft. Walking alone at night in some parts of the village does not feel safe for some. One person mentioned Bonfire Night and New Year's Eve as times when you do not feel safe at home, due to fireworks being let off.

Suggestions from participants about Feeling Safe

Police presence and a crackdown on drug dealing.

Challenges and issues in Cowlersley

Influence and Sense of Control

People commented that they are not given opportunity to take part in decision making. They are not sure how they would find out this information or who to contact about it, and wouldn't know how to go about helping make a change for the better. Some don't feel that the council, health services or housing associations work with the local community to understand their needs or make people feel involved. There were a number of comments that people are not listened to.

Suggestions from participants about Influence and Sense of Control

More ways for residents to have their say and get involved with current issues. Involve young people so they have a sense of pride in the village and themselves. A local community group, with meetings in an evening or on weekends, everyone invited.

Facilities and Amenities

Cowlersley is lacking amenities - there's one shop, a garage, a takeaway and a hairdressers. There's no village centre, but it's close to Milnsbridge. Travel to neighbouring villages is necessary for most things and there is an additional cost for people. Participants said it's a real shame that there is no library and there are no parent and toddler groups. There's a high number of takeaways in surrounding areas.

Suggestions from participants about Facilities and Amenities

Places for people to meet up: café, pub, restaurant. Developments should include new shops, amenities and community space. Spruce up Milnsbridge.

Traffic and Parking

"Parking is a nightmare." Parking on Cowlersley Lane makes it extremely dangerous to pull out from side roads (Windsor Road, Ladybower Avenue). It's hard for pushchairs as cars are often parked on dropped kerbs. Speed of traffic on Manchester Road from Cowlersley lights. Manchester Road is a big barrier to access between Cowlersley and Milnsbridge. Traffic through the centre of Milnsbridge is an issue and lack of parking and poor parking makes it worse.

Suggestions from participants about Traffic and Parking

Double yellow lines on the corners of Cowlersley Lane. Speed humps in the Manse Drive area. One way system from Cowlersley Lane along Manse Drive and Warneford Road. Explore Royal Horticulture Society solutions for both parking and nature in front gardens. Off street parking for residents and get rid of on street parking on Cowlersley Lane. Parking warden. Patrols and crossings by the schools. Parking area in Milnsbridge centre.

Ideas and actions

Following the initial engagement in 2019 and the subsequent re-engagement in 2022, Pride In Linthwaite have analysed the feedback offered by people in Linthwaite identifying actions that are both deliverable and beneficial to the local community. Some actions have already been taken, others are ongoing, and some will be long term aims. Pride in Linthwaite will keep the community updated on progress through their website and social media accounts.
